All work regarding the exterior of your home requires an application for consideration by the committee and approval before work starts. This includes but is not limited to trees, roofs, windows, siding and satellite dishes.

Once approved, the homeowner will receive a blue work permit to be displayed in the window of the home. Upon completion, the homeowner returns the blue slip to the office. A Committee member will visit the residence shortly thereafter to ensure the work was completed according to the application and close it out.

Our club is getting ready to meet once again in March and we are all looking forward to getting out into the fresh air to begin our work around the community. Our first meeting sets our agenda for what we need to get done for the year.

At this time of year, we begin to think about prepping our gardens when we at last get some mild days. If you didn't fertilize your trees last winter, you may want to do it now. Dig little holes two feet apart from the drip line and fill them with fertilizer. At the end of the month, you can also start fertilizing your shrubs, including any rose bushes. Each type of shrub requires a different fertilizer so be sure to read the packages before buying to make sure you have the appropriate type.

If you maintain a compost pile, now would be a good time to mulch around your shrubs and trees. You may also purchase compost manure. This is a great way to give your soil a chance to recuperate after the long winter months so you can enjoy strong, beautiful gardens come summer.

The indoor plants that have been giving you joy all winter may now be fertilized to spur their growth. If needed, wipe their leaves of any accumulating dust. Herbs may also be started indoors for eventual movement to the outdoors when the weather breaks.

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

REUBEN DIP - FOR APPETIZER

Ingredients:

- 32- oz. jar sauerkraut drained well
- 10 oz. of deli corned beef chopped
- 2 cups shredded cheddar cheese
- 2 cups of shredded swiss cheese

1/4 - cup Russian dressing

Rye - crackers

Directions:

- 1. In a large bowl mix first 5 ingredients
- 2. Transfer to a greased baking dish
- 3. Bake at 350* for 25-30 minutes until bubbling
- 4. Serve with rye crackers

The SLOW COOKER MAKES IT SIMPLE! Corned Beef Brisket

Ingredients:

- 3-4 lbs corned beef brisket
- 6 med. potatoes, peeled & quartered
- 2 med. onions, peeled & quartered
- 6 med. carrots, peeled & quartered
- 1 bay leaf
- 12 ozs. beer
- 2 tbsp molasses

Directions:

- 1. In the bottom of a slow cooker place potatoes, carrots, onions & bay leaf
- 2. Trim fat from brisket & place meat on top of vegetables

3. Mix beer & molasses & pour over meat

4. Cook covered 9-11 hrs.

Ingredients:

- 1/2 cup butter
- 1 1/2 cups sugar
- 2 large eggs
- 3/4 cup unsweetened applesauce
- 2 tsp vanilla
- 2 1/2 cups of flour
- 3 tsp. baking powder
- 1/2 tsp salt
- 1/2 cup BAILEYS IRISH CREAM

Directions:

- 1. Beat butter & sugar until fluffy
- 2. Add eggs 1 at a time, beat well after each
- 3. Beat in applesauce & vanilla
- 4. Combine flour, baking powder & salt, and add to cream mixture, alternating liqueur & beating well, each time.

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

PRIORITY FOR DRIVEWAY SNOW REMOVAL

As we approach another winter season, we again find it necessary to clarify who qualifies for the Priority Snow Removal list for 2021-2022 winter season. A new request is required every season.

For those who qualify, please submit your request to assure that you will be placed on the priority list. To qualify, a resident must require regular life-sustaining medical treatment, such as chemotherapy, radiation, or dialysis in or outside the home.

A "heart condition" does not qualify. Your request must be accompanied by a **physician script/note** which specifies that life-sustaining treatment for any of the conditions outlined above is necessary. Hand written notes are unacceptable. All information will be kept by the administrator and will be confidential.

Your need to go to work does not qualify for priority snow removal. For this purpose, we suggest you make advance arrangements with a private contractor for snow removal.

The township will cooperate by plowing our roads so that our contractor can begin work. Of course, the town will continue to respond to any serious problems during storms.

ALWAYS CALL 911 FOR ANY MEDICAL EMERGENCY

Please be sure to keep on hand extra supplies of medications and food so that you do not need to leave the house during or immediately after a snowstorm. The weather predications generally provide ample warning time for making preparations.

For convenience purposes, your doctor may fax this information to our office. Our fax number is 732-920-2650. Please be assured this information will be kept strictly confidential. Placement on the Priority Snow List cannot be accomplished until we receive the necessary documentation from your physician.

Please respond as soon as possible as the winter season will be here soon.
