
Beaverson Boulevard Cleanup June 2021

Reminder to All Property Owners

As per the Architectural Regulations, all property owners are requested to adhere to the following guidelines. Section XII Applications Not Required, Subsection B7. Lawn Decoration

Decorative lawn objects are to be located within the foundation planting area or edged lawn-bedding area. A maximum of five (5) items shall be permitted up to 18 inches in height. Two of the five decorations may be up to 36 inches in height.

The LHS Architectural Committee appreciates all property owners assistance in adherence to these guidelines as it aids in keeping our community manicured throughout the year. Stroll down the clubhouse corridor and read the bulletin boards. The information they contain will keep you abreast of what is happening in our Lions Head South community.

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

Well, as I'm writing this, we're having several beautiful days of 70-80 degrees with no humidity. Lest we forget summer came in with a bang. The West had a spell of 100+degree days and we were again in our usual hot and muggy weather and lots of rain. So, we can only hope the beautiful days will stay around for a while.

Because of the uncertainty of COVID, our Spring luncheon, arranged by Elaine Long, Jeanine Hogan and Lucy Coburn was held in the Lion's Den. It was a delightful change from our restaurant luncheons and was thoroughly enjoyed by all.

DID YOU KNOW???

- A Sunflower is not just one flower. Both the brown center and classic yellow petals are actually 1,000 to 2,000 individual flowers.
- There are more microorganisms in one teaspoon of soil than there are people on earth. These microbes are important for keeping the soil full of nutrients.
- Plants really do respond to sound. Sounds like an old wives' tale, but studies have shown vibrations can affect plant growth.
- Butterflies might be attracted to your weeds more than your flowers. It's more about the fragrance and nectar.
- Apples, peaches, cherries, raspberries, and strawberries are actually in the rose family.
- The color of hydrangea blossoms can vary from pink to blue depending on the acidity of the soil. Alkaline soil will result in pinker blooms, while acid soil will produce blue ones.
- The Japanese associate chrysanthemums with happiness and joy. In Malta, they are associated with death and funerals.
- Broccoli is technically a flower. The green florets on broccoli stalks will eventually open into tiny yellow flowers.
- In medieval times lavender was used to treat illnesses and ward off head lice, cholera and even the plague.
- Many orchids don't need soil to grow—they can get all their nutrients from the air.
- Moonflowers bloom only at night; their cousins, morning glories, bloom in the morning.



AUGUST GARDENING HINTS

It's time to divide Irises. With a knife, separate rhizomes, check for any borers (destroy them) and discard any soft or rotten rhizomes. Each rhizome division should have one leaf fan. Cut foliage back to 4-6 inches. Replant divisions 12-18 inches apart, with rhizome tops barely showing above the soil surface.

Asters are a popular choice for late summer and fall color. There are several varieties—tall and short and many colors. They attract bees and butterflies and are deer resistant.

Late August and September is the time for separating and transplanting peonies. They like acidic soil.

It is a good time for final fertilizing of all plants.

Check for gypsy moth egg masses on trees and shrubs. Remove and destroy.

VEGETABLES, FRUITS & HERBS AT THEIR "BEST"!

AUGUST brings us the best in vegetables, fruits, and herbs. The origin of vegetables dates back to 7,000 - 10,000 BC. when collected from the wild by hunters. Vegetables are grown all over the world, as climate permits. They can be eaten raw or cooked and are extremely important for nutrition.

Here are this month's recipes shared by friends & family!

TOMATO GALETTE

1 - unbaked pizza dough

6 oz. - mozzarella cheese sliced or shredded.

1/4 cup - pecorino grated.

- 1 diced shallot
- 4 sprigs of fresh thyme
- 1 tbsp fresh basil
- 1 clove of garlic chopped

1/4 tsp - ground black pepper

3 - medium tomatoes cubed

OVOO - for finishing

Directions:

- 1. Preheat oven to 400°.
- 2. Roll out pizza dough to a 12-15" round circle on floured parchment paper. Place on baking sheet.
- 3. Sprinkle mozzarella cheese on pizza dough leaving a 1 1 1/2" border.
- 4. In a med. size bowl, place cubed tomatoes, shallot, thyme, fresh basil, chopped garlic, & pepper. Toss & place over the cheese. Spread evenly. Discard the juice left in bowl.
- 5. Fold the borders inward toward the center of the pizza. Brush border with OVOO.
- 6. FINISH sparingly sprinkle with a light touch of OVOO over the pizza.
- 7. Bake for 45 mins. until bubbly & crispy.

SIMPLE CAPRESE ZOODLES

In a serving bowl...

4 zucchini - cut into noodles using a spiralizer cutter. Steam for 1 minute. Cool & place in bowl.

1 cup - fresh mozzarella cheese balls. Place in bowl.

- 2 diced peppers (red, green, orange or yellow). Place in bowl.
- 1 small eggplant grilled, sliced & cut into strips. Place in bowl.
- 1 ear of corn on the cobb steamed... peel nibblets off. Place in bowl.
- 2 cups cherry tomatoes
- 1 small head broccoli or broccolini steamed. Cut into small florets. Place in bowl.

SPRINKLE into bowl over veggies:

1/4 tsp - ground black pepper

dash of dried basil, oregano, thyme

2 tbsp. Balsamic vinegar

2 tbsp. Extra Virgin Oil

MIX WELL & SERVE

GRILLED ANGEL FOOD FRUIT CAKE

- 1 Angel food cake cut into 8 pcs. Placed on grill to slightly heat with visible grill marks.
- 1 large container of Cool Whip or 1 8oz container of whipping cream. (Add 1 tsp sugar when whipping).

*****In a medium to large bowl cut up the following fruits into small pieces & mix with 1/2 cup rum & 1/2 cup coconut: ripened peach, strawberries, pineapple, banana, blueberries, ripened cantaloupe.

Layer grilled cake on a cake plate, spoon 1/2 whipped cream over each slice, spoon fruit mix over each slice & continue to make another layer.... & sprinkle with chopped pecans.

AUGUST brings us 5 weeks and the winding down of SUMMER.

Hopefully, we will experience closer STEPS to the FREEDOM from COVID... Socializing back as we knew & enjoyed. AND children back to the classroom!

LIONS HEAD SOUTH COVID POOL RULES - 2021

- The Monitor, Board of Trustees, Recreation Committee Members, and the LHSA Administrator have the responsibility and authority to enforce the 2021 Pool Rules. It is the responsibility of the homeowners to comply with these rules.
- Swimming is only allowed when the Monitor is on duty. The Pool Rules must be followed or it could result in removal from the pool area and revocation of pool privileges.
 NO LIFEGUARD IS ON DUTY. Swim at your own risk.
- 3. Everyone must sign in. When leaving, belongings must also be removed.
- 4. Saving of space will not be permitted.
- 5. Resident Pool Badges are required for admittance.
- 6. **RESIDENTS ONLY.** No guests or children will be allowed admittance to the pool area.
- 7. For safety purposes, there will be no sitting on the stairs or ladders.
- 8. Only non-alcoholic beverages, in plastic or aluminum container, is permitted in pool area. Alcoholic beverages are not permitted.
- 9. Snacks, in single serve "containers, are" allowed in the pool area. Food should not be shared with non-household members. All residents are responsible for cleaning their own area after eating. Picnic tables will be provided outside of the pool fence for anyone having sandwiches, subs or pizza, etc.
- 10. NJ Health regulations require showering before entering the pool.
- 11. Smoking is not allowed in the fenced-in pool area. Designated smoking areas, at the end of the sidewalk by the parking lot, must be used. Dispose of cigarette butts and other garbage appropriately.
- 12. Residents must wear appropriate swimwear in the pool; cut-off pants or jeans are not permitted.
- 13. Floatation devices are not permitted. Personal noodles, will be permitted, but must be removed upon leaving the pool area for the day.
- 14. No diving is permitted. No sports, including ball playing or horseplay, are permitted.
- 15. Pets are prohibited in the pool area.
- The season will start on Monday June 21, 2021 and will extend through Sunday September 12, 2021, tentatively. Pool hours will be from 11:00 A.M. to 7:00 P.M. daily.
- 17. All pool complaints or concerns regarding pool rules or non-conformance of duties by the Monitor must be reported in writing to the LHSA Administrator.

These rules are a protection of your rights, not a restriction of your rights, and are presented to ensure your safety and enjoyment of the community. Your neighborly courtesy is appreciated.

These rules shall remain in effect unless changed or superseded by the LHSA Board of Trustees.

These rules may be amended by the CDC and the NJ Board of Health.
