As always, stay safe, most important, stay healthy and have a great Labor Day holiday.



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

Hope everyone had a great summer! Fall is the time when we think about home projects before the doldrums of winter are upon us. Our Lions Head community is always so good about keeping their homes in pristine condition.

With that in mind, we should remember that all projects on the outside of your home need to have approval of the Architectural Committee. Some of the frequent requests: If you are thinking about painting or new siding, you need approval for the color; if it's a new roof, that also needs approval for the color. Driveways and walkways have restrictions for size; so guess what, that needs to go before the committee. We want to keep consistency in our "beautiful" community; therefore, we require these items and so many more to be put before the Architectural Committee. Please refer to your booklet if you're unsure, or contact the Committee. All the members are happy to assist with your questions.

It is so much better to check the rules and regulations before you start your project, so you do not have to remove a beautifully completed flowerbed because it does not meet the standards. Or worse yet, if the situation is not corrected, you risk a fine.

Another area that occurs, especially as we get into the hurricane season and winter weather with strong winds, is the removal of trees. There are strict guidelines as to which trees can be removed and what kind of tree is allowed for replacement. Many of the regulations and requirements are due to ordinances from Brick Township. Preservation of our trees is very important to the Township, so please take the time to either check with someone from the Architectural Committee or review the rules and regulations.

The Architectural Committee is here to make it easier for you to complete your desired projects with no interruption. But sometimes homeowners forget they are in a planned community. The rules are clearly defined when you purchase your home and sign all your documents. Please remember this as you personalize your house, making it that special place to enjoy for years to come.

September is the countdown to the first frost date that includes lots of plans:

What needs to be brought indoors, what can stay outdoors for a little longer and where are you going to put them? Spring plans also need to get started this month. Irises can be divided; Peonies can be planted and Amaryllis brought indoors to become dormant until early November. Weigela and Hydrangea pruning will ensure beautiful blooms next spring.

Squirrels bury their nuts in the garden and dig up bulbs. If this is an issue, cover bulbs with a layer of chicken wire that a squirrel cannot breach.

Plant perennials this month. There are bargains to be found and they'll have plenty of time to settle in before winter. Fall blooming Asters and Chrysanthemums that are planted early enough may return for next year. Mums are perennial. Most of the ones sold in stores this month are produced in very controlled conditions so that they are just coming into bloom when you buy them. They will, however, still bloom after a light frost and come in a delightful range of colors.

This past spring it was our pleasure to do the spring plantings with a bit of extra enthusiasm....extra spiffy touches to help our community celebrate the 40th anniversary.

The Garden Club Members, finally after 2 years, got to have an off-premise luncheon held at Manera's, which proved to be most relaxing and most enjoyable.

With our host of volunteers, we are able to run a Scramble for 30-40 players, then relax somewhat at a Fun Day for 50 – 70 members and finish up the month with a tournament that handles 90 – 120 golfers. Our volunteers put in a lot of time and effort setting up, coordinating, running and participating in all of the events that are put on throughout the year for the benefit of all of our members. We are a lucky bunch at the LHCC, we have the best of retirement in a great, well-run community, and the access to a well maintained, beautiful golf course that is there for our enjoyment. Our ongoing question and wonder are, "why don't more of our community take advantage of the facilities that are available." Having golfed at LHCC for over twenty years and never had to have a Tee-Time is one of the real pleasures of being a part of, and a member of the LHCC. If you haven't already done so, check out the golf course, it truly is a great place to play and or learn how to play golf.

The next WGA Meeting is scheduled for Wednesday, September 7th and is held at the LHCC Clubhouse. Following the meeting, lunch is provided by Shorrock Gardens. The WGA provides the opportunity to get as involved with golf at whatever level you are looking for, and to participate in the WGA social life that you may find very enjoyable. Check it out, get involved, enjoy the facilities that are available to you in your community.

Fun Day is scheduled for Saturday, September 17th. This is our day, set-up, and organized for our enjoyment of the facilities that are available to us. We compete at putting, pitching, bean bag as well as a water balloon toss. Prizes are awarded and a complete BBQ/Cookout is provided.

The Brian Halm Annual Tournament is scheduled for Saturday, September 24th. This will be our first attempt at a full tournament since 2019, pre-COVID. We anticipate anywhere from 90 – 120 players. We pay out \$1,000 in cash prizes, plus an additional \$300 from the Shorrock Gardens Putting Contest, as well as many free gifts and a "goodie bag," of assorted gifts. Upon completion of the competition, we have an awards lunch to pass out the cash and additional prizes. This year the primary sponsor is Bright View, our Course maintenance contractor, along with Turf Master, Spirits Unlimited and Shorrock Gardens.

The money provided by these companies allows us to award the generous prizes and provide the assorted gifts. This year Shorrock Gardens is providing the Putting Contest which gives the top placed woman and man a putt for \$2,500.00. All in all we are so looking forward to a very successful tournament, weather permitting.

The results from the last Scramble, played on August 9th, have been posted to the LHS Website. The next Scramble is scheduled for Tuesday, September 13th. As always, Shorrock Gardens provides a continental breakfast and a light lunch.

The minutes for the August 15th General Membership Meeting are posted to the LHS Website and the LHCC BB. The next and last General Membership meeting for 2022 is scheduled for October17th. This meeting is also to elect new members to the Board of Directors for 2023. To actually hold an election, we must have a minimum of 25% of our members present. Be there, participate, be an active part of your golf course.

The minutes for the August 9th Board of Directors meeting are posted to the LHS Website and the LHCC BB. The next Board of Directors meeting is scheduled for Tuesday September 13th.

The **Hole-In-One program** has 34 participants worth a total of \$680.00. To date, we have two qualified Hole in Ones, Bob Jani and Jim Mort. Still lots of time to share in the winning pot and it is not too late to sign-up.

Part of our golf etiquette for LHCC is that each player is responsible for every ball hit. This means that any errant ball that causes any damage is the responsibility of that golfer. We stress to all golfers that if one of their errant hit balls causes damage or potential damage, to go to that house, car, etc and attempt to talk with the owner of the property. If this isn't possible then leave a note with the golfer name, phone number, etc, and report the incident to the Starter at the LHCC Clubhouse. In the event there isn't a Starter, the golfer will leave a detailed note of the incident along with the name and phone number of the golfer. For any resident experiencing any damage from an errant hit golf ball and the golfer did not or does not address the incident, call the golf course and report the incident. The LHCC Board of Directors will follow through on any reported incidents and will attempt to rectify the situation. ITALIAN CHEESE CAKE

Ingredients:

3 lbs. Ricotta - placed in a large bowl

6 eggs - beat in one at a time

1 1/4 cups sugar

1 tsp vanilla

Combine the following three ingredients in a separate bowl, mix well then add to the above:

2 tbsp melted butter

1 pint of sour cream

-Bake 1 hour (DO NOT OPEN OVEN) in a pre-heated oven 375* until brown on top.

-(LOOK THROUGH WINDOW - DO NOT OPEN OVEN).

-Use a 10" spring pan.

-LEAVE IN OVEN TO COOL OVERNIGHT OR FOR SEVERAL HOURS.

-Just before you're ready to serve, you can add different fruit pie filling on top: CHERRY, BLUEBERRY, STRAWBERRY, etc.

You may want to STOP at "JERSEY MIKES" - if not BUILD your own Hoagie!

This is one of my favorites:

Ingredients:

-Base of Hoagie (or you may call it a SUB): Pick your favorite roll that resembles a submarine.

-Always ask for thinly sliced: Tavern Ham, Genoa Salami, Pepperoni

-Layer on fresh Jersey tomatoes, roasted red peppers, or vinegar peppers, hot or sweet, shredded lettuce & thin

slices of fresh mozzarella.

-OPTIONAL: A sprinkle of EVOO/VINEGAR.

The **OFFICIAL FUNDAY** calendar also posts Sept. 26th as "*NATIONAL PANCAKE DAY*"!HERE'S a GREAT SUGGESTION FROM Lisa Wood!

Use any pancake recipe. Instead of using any water or any milk, use SELTZER for light & fluffy cakes.

Ingredients: A SIMPLE, SINFULLY & SATISFYING CAKE!

1 1/2 cup all-purpose flour

1 tbsp baking powder

2 tbsp granulated sugar

1 1/4 cup SELTZER (in place of milk product)

4 tbsp unsalted butter

1 egg

1 tsp vanilla

1/2 tsp salt

-WHISK all ingredients in a mixing bowl.

-Preheat a flat grill & LIGHTLY spray with PAM.

-Pour a ladle of mixture onto the grill to crate the cake; flip when bubbles begin.

-OPTIONAL add-ins always add a layer of flavor: Berries, Bananas, Chocolate Chips.

SPOTTED LANTERNFLY


One of our residents saw one of these bugs on our golf course recently. He went to the trouble of finding the attached article. We all need to be aware of these harmful bugs.

(TRENTON) - The New Jersey Department of Agriculture is encouraging residents and business owners to go to www.badbug.nj.gov to find information that can assist them in learning how to fight the spotted lanternfly. The webpage includes a timeline for the stages of growth for the insect as well as treatment options.

The spotted lanternfly is currently in the nymph stage, where it is tiny and black with white dots but will soon advance to its next stage and become red with white dots. The bug reaches full maturity in mid-to-late August, when it begins laying egg masses that will hatch next spring. The NJDA continues to ask residents to stomp on or destroy the spotted lanternfly whenever possible.

"The more of these that we can eliminate before they mature, means fewer will reach adulthood," NJDA Secretary Douglas H. Fisher said. "While we have crews that are working throughout the state to reduce the spotted lanternfly population, everyone can join the fight against this invasive pest."

Along with the treatment options listed at www.badbug.nj.gov, residents can also use businesses that are licensed pesticide applicators to provide treatments to kill the spotted lanternfly. However, if residents do choose an over-thecounter treatment option, they should carefully follow directions on the product when applying it.

While the spotted lanternfly does not harm humans or animals, it can feed on about 70 different types of vegetation or trees. The pest's preferred host is the Tree of Heaven, an invasive plant that has been in the United States for decades. The spotted lanternfly is native to Asia and was first found in the U.S. in Berks County, Pa., in 2014. It is considered a plant hopper and can fly only a few feet at a time. However, the spotted lanternfly is an excellent hitchhiker and can travel on almost any kind of transportation for several miles, even in its nymph stages, which has allowed it to spread to several states.

The Department is also asking for people to check their vehicles before leaving an area to make sure the pest is not coming along for the ride. The NJDA has a checklist of items and places on where to look for the spotted lanternfly before leaving an area here. The checklist serves to inform the public about the spotted lanternfly, including how to identify all life stages of the insect and minimize its movement.

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
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
