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ARCHITECTURAL COMMITTEE

As we all face this worldwide pandemic, there are so many things to be grateful for, including this beautiful community we share. However, in order to keep this community well maintained, there are rules and regulations we must abide by to preserve our lovely surroundings.

The Architectural Rules and Regulations outline which projects, outside of your home, require an application to be submitted and approved before the start of work. There are a small number of owners or renters that fail to do this and after completing these projects it is discovered, either by complaint or inspections by the Architectural Committee, they are in violation. This can become very costly to correct or remove the unapproved violation. Please read the Rules and Regulations before commencing work.

GARBAGE & RECYCLING CAN COMPLIANCE....

Recently warnings have been issued for noncompliance of our by-laws concerning garbage and recycling can storage. Over the past 2 months, there has been given over 20 warnings for cans left in front of garages, on rear patios and sides of houses hidden behind air conditioning units. This has been an ongoing problem. Violation notices, a \$10 a day fine until corrected, will be issued. Inspections are done at the end of the week to allow time to remove and store the cans in the garage as outlined in the by-laws.

Please read the By-laws Section 10.9 page 26 which states: Residents shall use only the automated garbage containers provided by Brick Township. They shall be placed at the curb no sooner than 4:00 pm on the day prior to collection. Empty containers shall be removed from the curb by 8:00 pm on the day of collection and placed indoors by 8:00 am on the day following collection. The same schedule shall apply to recyclables.


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
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COMMUNITY AWARENESS



Not quite sure how to write this article which is being written at the end of April. Obviously, as you have witnessed, we have not been able to keep to any kind of schedule because of the quarantine under which we have had to live. Our spring decorating fell by the wayside and we are hoping to be able to resume our summer work sometime in May. As of this writing we just don't know.

So, just because we have not been out and about this spring, you may have begun your outdoor work. As you know each home must have a tree planted on the street side of their home. Keep in mind that before you plant or replace a tree, you must have approval by the Architectural Committee. Once you have approval for your small deciduous tree (one that loses it leaves in winter before becoming dormant), you may prepare to plant. Dig the hole at least 50% larger than the ball or the pot. Make sure you have a good mix of soil. Don't bury the crown—the place where the stem and the root meet. Once planted, hand water—no sprinkler. Water by hand the first two days, and then 3-4 times a week for the growing season. Then sit back and enjoy your new addition.



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


