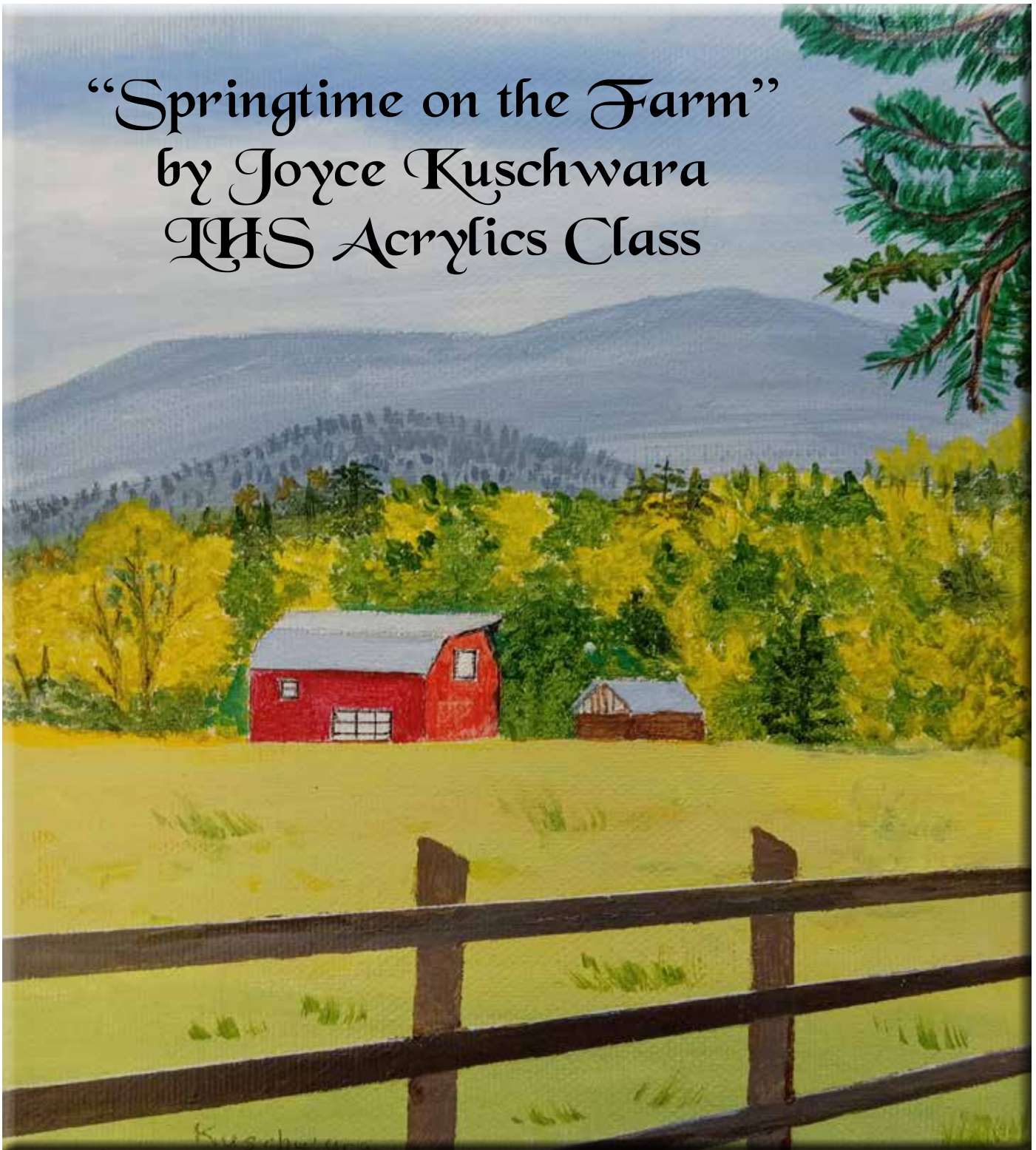

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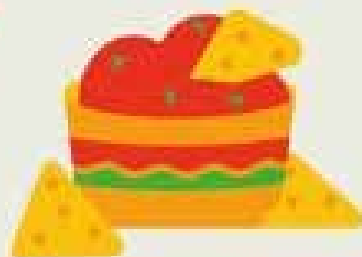

Architectural Regulations Revisions

Please Tear out and Place in the Lions Head South By-Laws Architectural Regulations, Page 14, XV. Exterior Storage of Trash or Supplies

Revisions to Restrictions on Common Property Uses and Exterior Storage of Trash or Supplies, Second Paragraph.

Motion approved by the Board of Trustees February 12, 2024.

PLEASE NOTE REVISION TO PAGE 14, XV. EXTERIOR STORAGE OF TRASH OR SUPPLIES TO READ AS FOLLOWS:

Lions Head South Architectural Regulations Page 14, XV. Exterior Storage Deck Box and Upright Garden/Storage Container. Replaces 2nd Paragraph.

One (1) small deck box, no larger than six (6) feet in length, thirty-six (36) inches in height and thirty-six (36) inches deep, with a top hinged lid only, may be placed behind the air conditioner on either side of the house, but not on the street side if a corner property. It may also be placed on the rear patio at the rear of the house. In addition, one (1) upright storage/garden container, measuring no larger than six (6) feet in height, three (3) feet wide and three (3) feet deep may be stored on the rear patio. A maximum of two (2) units (one of each) maybe placed on each property. The storage units may not be made of wood and must be constructed of man-made materials. It must be stand-alone and may not be attached to the house. The color must blend in with the existing color of the house. Prior approval of the size, color and location of the storage unit (s) is required by the Architectural Committee.

COMMUNITY AWARENESS

Hello Lions Head South residents. So many great establishments are opening in Brick. Among them are Bagel Pit, MJ's Bar and Grill, Premier Choice Cardiology, Mr. Softee, California Cold Brew and Unscathed Cuts. Also, Charley's Cheesesteak is inside Walmart. And don't forget we now have Livoti's Old World Market, too.

The Mayor and the Council are working on the No Left Turn on Route 88 where the Popeye's is going, by the WAWA. They are also working on putting signage on Route 70 for Aldi's before you get to the entrance. It's dangerous for people slowing down to get to the entrance.

The Property Tax Reimbursements increased their maximum income to \$150K. Pharmaceutical Assistance Program (PAAD) guidelines have increased for individuals to \$52,142 and for couples \$59,209. If you have an income above this limit, the state has a Senior Gold Prescription Discount Program. Individual's income would be \$62,142 and couples would be \$69,209.

Musical Connections is an intergenerational program at the Senior Center, with Brick High School students. This program stimulates the brain and body, promotes both social interaction and music engagement, and strengthens the sense of community in a safe environment. It's held on the first and third Tuesday of each month at 1:45pm. Call to register at 732-920-8688.

GARDEN CLUB

As I'm preparing this month's article, the temperature outside is 56 degrees and rising. What a week of lovely weather (although some rain is predicted). Just a few more weeks and spring will be here with all its beautiful blossoms.

The Garden Club is a group of volunteers working to beautify and enhance our community with flowers for all to enjoy. With the cooperation of the Trustees and the Building and Grounds Committee, we plant and maintain several gardens, various decorative planters and seasonal decorations at entrances. This year promises to be an unusually busy year for us. The new pool will bring new ideas for our container plantings as well as the prospect of a butterfly garden to attract pollinators. All this is in addition to our planting, watering, weeding and caring for our regular gardens. Sounds like a lot, but with many willing volunteers the work gets easily done.

The committee for the replacement of old and dead plantings along the back wall of the clubhouse has been working throughout February and March planning for this area. Hopefully, the completion of this project will coincide with the completion of the pool.

This year Arbor Day in New Jersey is celebrated on April 28th. (Some states have different dates according to the best planting times.) Arbor day is celebrated in many countries. It is a day set aside to remind us to plant a tree, care for a tree, or just climb a tree. Trees support our health and the health of our planet! They clean our air and water and provide shade, which cools our urban areas. On a personal level, trees calm us and reduce our stress levels. Trees also support wildlife and our entire ecosystem. One oak tree attracts thousands of pollinators and beneficial insects. Trees provide birds and aquatic animals with habitats. In addition, they provide humans with powerful medicine, materials for living and agriculture. Finally, trees are our biggest allies as the world climate warms.

Alfred Joyce Kilmer, born in New Brunswick, New Jersey, was an American writer and poet mainly remembered for his short poem titled "Trees", written in 1914. It has also been set to music and is very often recalled on Arbor Day. You might remember it from grammar school.

I think that I shall never see a poem lovely as a tree.

A tree whose hungry mouth is prest against the earth's sweet flowing breast;

A tree that looks at God all day, and lifts her leafy arms to pray;

A tree that may in summer wear a nest of robins in her hair;

Upon whose bosom snow has lain; Who intimately lives with rain.

Poems are made by fools like me, but only God can make a tree.

The many deer in our area, when hungry, will eat almost anything. When preparing your garden, select plants which are deer-resistant, although under poor food conditions, they will eat even these. Following are some familiar plant suggestions from Rutgers Cooperative Research and Extension. Many are perennials, so if you're successful keeping the deer away, you won't have to buy or plant next year: Ageratum, Snapdragon, Dusty Miller, Anise, Rosemary, Candytuft, Lobelia, Basil, Parsley, Salvia, Nasturtium Verbena, Nasturtium Zinnia, Mint, Common Foxglove, Daffodil, Calla Lily, Hyacinth, Tulip.

Remember, the months of May and June are the worst time for tick bites. Take precautions when working outdoors. Wear light clothing and check yourself carefully when returning indoors.

You are invited to become a part of this exciting, busy club. We meet on the second Wednesday of the month, March through November. Dates of our monthly meetings can be found in the Pride calendar. Our next meeting will be on Wednesday, April 10th, at 10:30 AM in the Lion's Den.

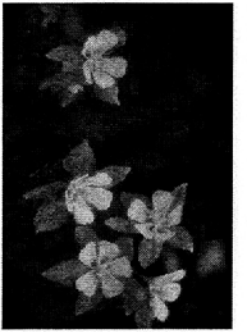

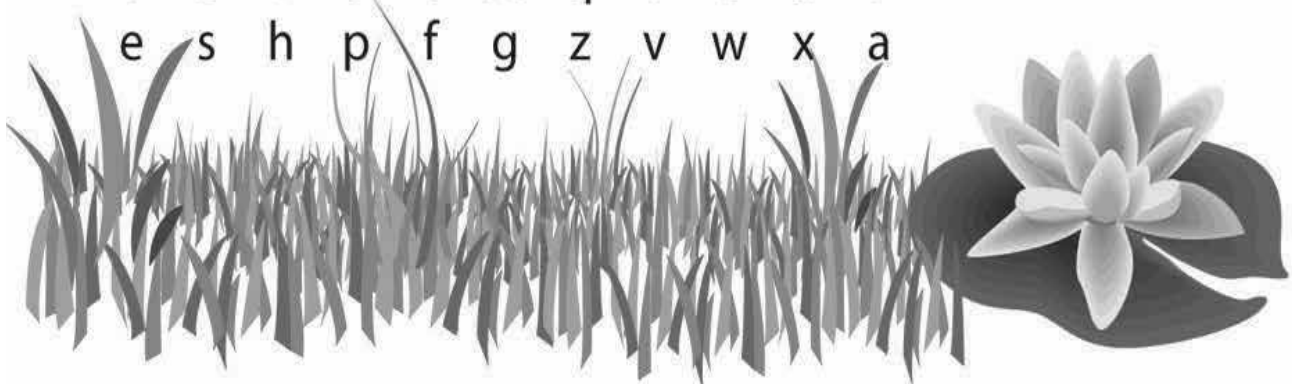

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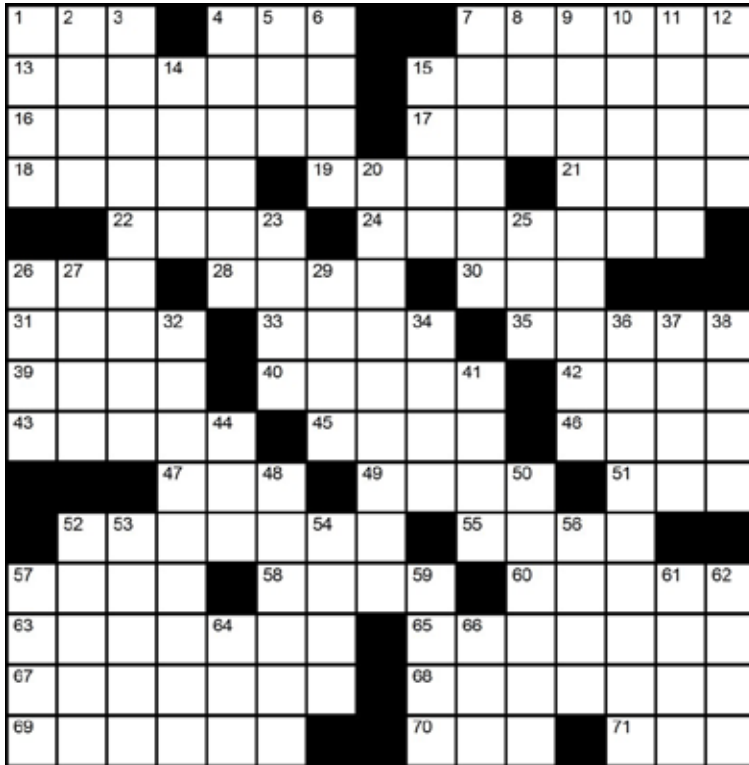

Below are SEAFOOD dishes WHAT BETTER TIME OF THE YEAR TO TRY FRESH SEAFOOD?

ROASTED FISH

Buy a few fillets of white-fleshed fish, like fluke or flounder. Place a sheet pan in a 425 degree oven and let it get hot. In a small bowl make a sauce with a few tablespoons of soy sauce, sherry and a heaping tablespoon of grated ginger, adding thinly sliced scallions to the mixture. Then add minced garlic, chile oil or sesame oil. Salt & pepper the fish. Pull out the hot sheet pan, coat with neutral oil, place fish on the pan and CAREFULLY ROAST for a minute. Pull out, then paint the fillets with sauce and cook for another minute or two until the fish is just cooked through. Serve with rice and greens!

STEAMED MUSSELS

Simple ... Buy a bag of mussels ... Scrub and de-beard, if necessary. In a large pot saute some cubed chorizo (or hot sausage) in EVOO over medium heat. When the sausage starts to crisp, add a few handfuls of halved cherry tomatoes and several cloves of smashed garlic. When the tomato skins split, add the mussels and a glass of white wine. COVER and allow mussels to steam open. (If any mussels didn’t open, pull out and ditch them.) Garnish with chopped fresh parsley and serve with toasted Italian bread!

Happy spring! Enjoy the weather as it warms up, and just a few words of wisdom to enjoy the season while staying safe and secure. Don’t trust your caller ID! Sadly, there is a new way to scam people via the telephone. Scammers can make ANY name or number show up on your caller ID. That’s called spoofing. So even if your caller ID shows it’s a government agency like the Social Security Administration calling, matches the Customer Service number on the back of your credit card or is your bank, BEWARE! First of all, Social Security will NEVER, EVER call you! HANG UP THE PHONE! You can then call your credit card company or bank directly (or whatever name comes up on caller ID) to verify your account is intact. Once you give personal information out and your accounts are hacked or emptied, there is very little recourse, so be cautious!

Reach out to your neighbors! We live in a marvelous community of active residents. However, some live alone and far away from family. It would be wonderful if people could reach out and check on our neighbors occasionally, even if it is just to say hello. According to Steve Cole, PhD, director of Social Genomic Care Lab at the University of California, the research is clear on how loneliness impacts not only our mental health but our physical health as well. “Loneliness acts as a fertilizer for other diseases,” Dr. Cole said. “The biology of loneliness can accelerate the buildup of plaque in arteries, help cancer cells grow and spread, and promote inflammation in the brain leading to Alzheimer’s disease. Loneliness promotes several different types of wear and tear on the body.” Perhaps just having your neighbor open their shades in the morning or the front door to give you a signal that they are okay is an easy way to reach out. Even a five minute phone call to chat about the weather would go a long way in helping people feel connected. It will make you feel better too!
