

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
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#### **BUILDING & GROUNDS**

#### Project Safe Lock

Project Safe Lock is a program which assists residents who would be unable to answer the door in the event of an emergency. If you or another resident you know of could benefit from this program, please contact any security committee member for additional information.

#### Security Cameras

Plans to install security cameras at each entrance and exit of the community are currently on hold until the completion of the Verizon FIOS installation. More details to follow as the information becomes available.

#### 25 MPH Speed Signs

The faded "25 MPH" sign painted on the road surface at Ashford and Yorkwood will look to be repainted. The community is currently waiting on a response back from Brick Township.

#### **Street Lighting**

Ongoing communications continue with JCPL to replace streetlights as needed and to replace them with a bulb that allows enhanced vision in the areas.

As per the LHS by-laws, it is a requirement to have your house number visible above your garage door and/or on your mailbox. This is for your safety and Police/Fire/ EMS emergency responders.



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#### **GARDEN CLUB**

#### HE KNOWS NO WINTER

He knows no winter, he who loves the soil, For, stormy days, when he is free from toil, He plans his summer crops, selects his seeds From bright-paged catalogues for garden needs. When looking out upon frost-silvered fields, He visualizes autumn's golden yields; He sees in snow and sleet and icy rain Precious moisture for his early grain; He hears spring-heralds in the storm's turmoil He knows no winter, he who loves the soil.

Even though our New Year's Eve celebration was canceled, we trust you all celebrated safely. Hopefully, the new year will bring us closer to normalcy, whatever the new normal may be.

The good news is, as I am writing this, the weather for many days of December has been in the 40s. Hopefully, that held true for January, too. February can be tricky, but as cold as it can get, it is still that much closer to spring. Soon we'll be digging and planting again.

Keep those seed and nursery catalogues nearby and enjoy the planning of your next garden. Look for plants with improved insect, disease and drought tolerance. Selecting native plants can be helpful also. Order them now to be ready when the ground thaws. Some herbs such as parsley or basil can be started indoors to get a head start.

If you received an Amaryllis for the holidays, chances are the bloom is already a memory. Remove the spent flower and set the plant in a bright, sunny window to allow the leaves to fully develop. Keep the soil evenly moist, not soggy. Fertilize occasionally with a general-purpose houseplant formulation.

The most important environmental factor in growing plants indoors is adequate light. Take note of where light enters your home and place plants accordingly. Most plants enjoy day temperatures between 65 and 75 degrees, with night temperatures 5 to 10 degree cooler. Be careful placing plants near drafty windows or heat or air conditioning vents.

When watering plants, use room temperature water. Be aware of your plant's watering needs. Some plants prefer to dry between watering. Others prefer to remain moist. To maintain humidity, place plants on pebbles on water-filled trays.

#### **Some additional February hints:**

- -Be careful using chemicals for icy pathways. Sand is a better replacement.
- -Continue to inspect indoor plants for insects.
- -Start to fertilize houseplants on a regular basis with a water-soluble fertilizer prepared at half strength until growth is healthy.
- -Remove diseased or damaged limbs from trees and shrubs.
- -Bring spring into your home a little early with branches of forsythia, pussywillow and quince brought inside to force bloom.
- -Most of all, be careful of icy patches while walking outdoors.

Our first meeting of the new year will be Wednesday, March 9, at 10:30AM, hopefully in the Lion's Den, COVID-19 permitting. Stay safe, hope to see you there.

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



1/2 cup Maya Chocolate Teeccino (can be purchased at Wegmans, Walmart, Amazon, Ebay or other speciality food markets)

1/2 cup dark brown sugar

1 tbsp. black pepper, ground

1 tsp. Kosher salt



1 tsp. cumin

2 tsp. garlic powder

1 tbsp. Chili powder

1 tbsp. paprika

#### THE DESSERT: NO BAKE ECLAIR CAKE

2 (3.5 oz) pkgs. instant vanilla pudding mix

1 (8oz.) Cool Whip thawed

3 cups milk

2 sleeves Graham cracker squares

1 (16 oz.) tub chocolate frosting

#### **Directions:**

- 1. In a medium bowl, mix together pudding, milk & Cool Whip
- 2. In a 9"x13" baking dish, arrange single layer of graham crackers
- 3. Spread 1/2 the pudding mixture on top of crackers
- 4. Layer of crackers over pudding mixture
- 5. Layer other half of pudding mixture on top of crackers
- 6. Top with final layer of crackers
- 7. Place plastic wrap over dish and refrigerate for 30 mins.
- 8. Place tub of chocolate frosting in microwave for 15 seconds (remove the aluminum foil top before placing in microwave)
- 9. Frosting will be soft. Stir, remove plastic and spread chocolate evenly over crackers
- 10. Place plastic wrap over dish and refrigerate overnight (graham crackers need time to soften)

#### PRIORITY FOR DRIVEWAY SNOW REMOVAL

As we approach another winter season, we again find it necessary to clarify who qualifies for the Priority Snow Removal list for 2021-2022 winter season. A new request is required every season.

For those who qualify, please submit your request to assure that you will be placed on the priority list. To qualify, a resident must require regular life-sustaining medical treatment, such as chemotherapy, radiation, or dialysis in or outside the home.

A "heart condition" does not qualify. Your request must be accompanied by a physician script/note which specifies that life-sustaining treatment for any of the conditions outlined above is necessary. Hand written notes are unacceptable. All information will be kept by the administrator and will be confidential.

Your need to go to work does not qualify for priority snow removal. For this purpose, we suggest you make advance arrangements with a private contractor for snow removal.

The township will cooperate by plowing our roads so that our contractor can begin work. Of course, the town will continue to respond to any serious problems during storms.

#### ALWAYS CALL 911 FOR ANY MEDICAL EMERGENCY

Please be sure to keep on hand extra supplies of medications and food so that you do not need to leave the house during or immediately after a snowstorm. The weather predications generally provide ample warning time for making preparations.

For convenience purposes, your doctor may fax this information to our office. Our fax number is 732-920-2650. Please be assured this information will be kept strictly confidential. Placement on the Priority Snow List cannot be accomplished until we receive the necessary documentation from your physician.

Please respond as soon as possible as the winter season will be here soon.









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
