

As I write this message, it is Feb 5th and the weather outside is almost spring-like. We have been lucky so far (keeping my fingers and toes crossed) that the weather has held up and we haven't been hit with any snow. A few degrees colder and all the rain we've been getting would have been snow.

The grounds around the golf course look so much neater after Jim Mort had all of the overgrown brush and weeds cleaned up. Kudos Jim. Looks great.

In closing, I just want to remind you all once again to get involved. This is your community and it needs your input and help to stay as close to pristine as possible. Stay well. Stay safe. Stay involved.

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EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT

LHS Emergency Management Committee was formed after Hurricane Sandy. We felt that our residents deserved to know what to do and where to get help during an emergency. The following guideline and evacuation information is important for all of us to know. Even though we would notify and provide information during an actual emergency, we felt it prudent to remind residents of our process. We also plan to feature a speaker from the Brick C.E.R.T team at our March 9, 2020 Residents' Meeting at 7pm. Please try to attend. Thank you.

EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT GUIDELINES 2020

In the event of an emergency, the subsequent guidelines will be followed at Lions Head South.

The Clubhouse will serve as an information center. Its purpose will be to supply residents with available services and resources from local organizations and to share timely information. It will not be used to house or provide physical provisions to residents.

Chairman of the Emergency Management Committee will contact a trustee to get clearance to open the Clubhouse. Security will also be contacted.

Important information will be passed on to residents by a Robo call.

Residents who plan to leave the community for an extended amount of time, will be asked to complete an Evacuation Form available at the Clubhouse during the emergency. These forms will provide us with contact and status information to use throughout the current situation.

Emergency Management Committee members will be called. Organization contacts will be assigned. Available members will meet at the Clubhouse and assist in completing forms, answer questions, gather and provide information from organizations, and help guide residents through the emergency. They will also review and discuss the current situation to determine if additional actions are needed.

Please be aware that residents who require oxygen for life support can preregister with JCP&L. Call 1-800-662-3115. At the prompt say "Critical Care." A "Life Support" form will be sent to you. It must be completed by both you and your physician and returned. Once approved, your priority status will be recognized during power outages or emergencies.


Lions Den Thursday, March 26, 2020 4:00 P.M. - 7:00 P.M.

News from Mayor Ducey's Senior Community Meeting on 2/4/2020:

- 1. An announcement will be made on April 30th on which town was selected for a new VA Hospital. If Brick is selected, the hospital will be built on the corner of Jack Martin Blvd, Burrsville Rd and Rt. 88.
- 2. New Jersey Natural Gas will be replacing a gas main on Mantoloking Rd. The work is scheduled to begin the end of February and last through March. The work will be done 4 days a week, 10 hrs. a day, Monday through Thursday.
- 3. There is a new park being built across from Brick Beach 3 and the parking lot for Brick Beach 3 is being paved.
- 4. Upcoming Entertainment and Activities:
 - 5/31 **Longest Table Event** A Sunday dinner will be served for anyone who wants to participate. 4 pm at Haven Homestead. The Chamber of Commerce is donating the food. Volunteers are needed.
 - **Summerfest** The entertainment (4 bands) for Summerfest 2020 has been announced. Summerfest will start 1/2 hour earlier at 7:30 pm.
- 5. **Retail Stores -** Comings and Goings:
 - Corrados' Market is continuing renovation of the Pathmark in Laurel Square and aiming for a June 2020 opening.
 - Starbucks is building a store in front of the Stop and Shop Shopping Center on Brick Blvd.
 - Hand & Stone is expanding their retail space.
 - Royal Farms (gas station and convenience store) is waiting on State approvals to move into where Jersey Paddle was.
 - Mike's Crumb Cake Factory is open on Rt. 88 (across from Laurel Square).
- 6. Caregiver Volunteers A representative from Caregiver Volunteers spoke at the meeting they offer various services to seniors who have given up driving a car. Their services can include driving you to medical appts, food shopping or even visiting you in your home. They also offer respite care to caregivers of Alzheimer patients. If you or someone you know can use their services call them at 732-505-2273 for information.
- 7. **Senior Outreach Services** offer several programs to seniors. Check the bulletin board for more details. Currently they are offering a service to help seniors do their taxes if interested call as soon as possible to make an appointment 732-920-8686.





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
LH COUNTRY CLUB

As we rapidly move through the winter, we are aggressively preparing the course for the 2020 season. Some of the work being done can be readily seen from the surrounding roads. Holes 8 and 9 have been cleaned out by Turf Master. They made an offer we could not refuse, to take these two holes and show us what Turf Master could do to improve the appearance of the overall golf course. They have done a remarkable job and we are very pleased with the results to date. With the anticipation of the cold weather the work on our yearly Tree Trimming and course management program was initiated. We have concentrated our efforts this year on holes 2, 5 and 9. The initial intent is to move the fairways on these holes further to the right of their previous alignment in an attempt to reduce the number of golf balls hit down the surrounding roads, Lions Head Blvd. and Ashford. Depending on the weather it is anticipated that the golf course will be opened early, sometime toward the end of February. In the future every effort will be made to have our golf course open for play the maximum amount of time possible year around, the only restriction being the weather.

During this part of the year we are going through our Re-registration period and we would like to remind all residents of LHS that this is your golf course, check it out, use it if you can. To assist anyone interested in taking up golf and/or just giving it a shot, we have an annual Golf Clinic in May. The Clinic is free to all residents of LHS and we encourage any and all to give it a try. For the Golf Clinic all you need is your personal enthusiasm; we provide clubs, golf balls and instructions. Getting involved in the game of golf does not have to be an expensive experience. We have accumulated several complete sets of golf clubs that we sell at a reasonable rate, golf balls are available 10 for a dollar.

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The fun, laughter and friends are free. As if all of that is not sufficient reason to give golf a try, LHCC is one of the best maintained courses in the immediate area. We are very proud of our golf course and would like nothing better than to have more participation from the community. We also encourage all residents of the community to recommend our course to anyone you know that has any interest in golf. Non-residents of LHS/LHN can join as full members of LHCC, the only restriction is age. You must be 55 years old. Any questions, please call me.

FYI, The LHCC Driving Net practice area is open all year round, weather permitting. It is your facility, use it.

THE RECIPE BOX

March is National Nutrition Month! NEW YORK TIMES 5 STAR EASY VEGETABLE SOUP

22 cals per 1 cup serving

1 lb. chopped zucchini

1 can of corn

1/2 bag fresh spinach

2 plum tomatoes chopped

1 Tbsp. sliced garlic

1 splash of stock (vegetable)

ADD-ONS - (after soup is finished in microwave) salt, pepper (to taste) sliced basil, 1 tbsp. OO.

PLACE all ingredients into a microwave safe bowl, except add on's.

COVER and microwave until halfway (until veggies are tender & tomatoes have created a broth) stirring & stopping. Approx. 8-10 mins. total cook time!

FINISH/GARNISH - with olive oil, salt & pepper, & basil.

GRILLED HALIBUT STEAK

20 minutes - serves 4

4 Halibut steaks (oz. pcs.)

3 Tbsp dry white whine

1/4 cup freshly squeezed lemon juice

2 Tbsp. olive oil

1 tbsp fresh chopped rosemary (options: tarragon or thyme) salt & pepper (to taste)

1 Tbsp. butter

IN A NON-STICK FRY PAN, warm OO & melt butter.

ONCE THE PAN IS HOT, add the fish skin down & cook on high heat to get a good sear on the skin.

REDUCE HEAT, sprinkle fish with wine, lemon juice, selected herbs, S&P ... cook for approx. 7 mins. & flip for an additional 3 mins.

GINGERBREAD COFFEE PROTEIN BITES

1 cup almonds

16 pitted dates

1 1/2 tsp. cocoa powder

1/2 tsp cinnamon

1/4 tsp ginger

1/2 tsp vanilla extract

pinch of cloves, nutmeg, all spice & salt

1 serving (as listed on container) of cafe latte protein powder

IN A FOOD PROCESSOR - pulse almonds (but not fine); ADD all other ingredients & pulse until sticky dough. Roll in small balls. If dough is dry, ADD a tsp of warm water...

As I'm writing this, (mid-January), with several 40-50-degree days, we have been lucky enough to see only a few snow flurries, but we all know strange things can happen in February and March.

You can bring the beauty of the outdoors and nature into your home by providing a variety of houseplants. This can be for all seasons and you can truly bring in a breath of fresh air as many plants help clear the air. To be successful here are a few hints you should consider.

- Adequate light is probably the most important factor in growing indoor plants. Know the needs of your plants and place them accordingly.
- Most plants prefer day temperatures between 65 and 75 degrees with night temperatures usually 5-10 degrees lower. Be careful in placing near window drafts, radiators, heating and air conditioning vents.
- Know your plant's needs regarding water. Some plants prefer their soil to dry between watering and others prefer keeping soil just slightly moist. When watering, use room temperature water.
- March is a good time to start fertilizing your indoor plants.
 Use half strength till growth is robust.
 - Some common plants that are good for clearing the air: English Ivy Grows in sun or shade.

Prayer Plant - Interesting to watch as leaves close at night, easy to care for.

Boston Fern - Likes cool location with high humidity and indirect light.

Snake plants - easy to care for, hard to kill, prefers drier soil.

Some simple herbs to grow indoors:

 $\underline{\text{Parsley}}$ - This herb supplies important vitamins and minerals. For instance, just 1/4 cup of fresh parsley

provides a third of your vitamin C daily requirement. It is also an excellent source of potassium, folic acid and some calcium, manganese and iron. Who would guess this little green leaf could be so healthy? Just a few seeds in some potting soil, good light, and moderate watering can give you an ample supply till you can move it outdoors where it will flourish. Cutting from the outside leaves will keep the center growing.

<u>Chives</u> - Another plant easily grown inside provides many essential minerals, including potassium, calcium, folic acid, vitamin A and C. Wait till they are about 6 inches before cutting. They can be snipped and will continue sprouting. Planted outdoors, they are perennial. And don't overlook the flowers. They are a delicate pink color with a mild flavor which you can add to salads or just use in a bouquet.


Also keep in mind that houseplants need to be cleaned occasionally. If leaves are coated by dust or other residue, it can reduce the amount of light necessary for the plant to get oxygen. Use 1/2 cup milk with 3/4 cup water to spray underneath and on top of leaves. Rub gently with a cloth and wipe off with a clean dry cloth. You can also use this on outdoor plants that appear dingy or dull.

As soon as the temperatures cooperate, it is time to begin your spring garden clean-up. Remove any accumulating debris and turn over the soil. It is also a good time to have the pH tested. You can do this by purchasing a kit for this purpose or you can contact the Rutgers Agricultural Center on Whitesville Road, Toms River (732-349-1245). They will give you instructions for having them test the soil for you for a small fee. With this info you can sit back and wait for nice warm temperatures to begin planting your garden.



Your request must be accompanied by a physician's script/note which specifies that life-sustaining treatment for any of the conditions outlined above is necessary. Hand written notes are unacceptable. All information will be kept by the Administrator and will be confidential. Your need to go to work does not qualify for priority snow removal. We suggest you make advance arrangements with a private contractor for snow removal.

The township will cooperate by plowing our roads so that our contractor can begin work. Of course, the town will continue to respond to any serious problems during storms.

ALWAYS CALL 911 FOR ANY MEDICAL EMERGENCY.

Please be sure to keep on hand extra supplies of medications and food, so that there is no need to leave the house during or immediately after a snowstorm. The weather predictions generally provide ample warning time for making preparations.
