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GARDEN CLUB

Nothing better than this time of year when everything is turning green and we begin to think about planting our gardens and beautifying the community. The Garden Club has been active since our March meeting to plan our work for the upcoming planting season.

Winter decorations have been removed and we've taken inventory to see what needs to be done to prepare for our work. The front porch will be cleaned before we decorate and we will be purchasing new pots and soil.

Even though we may be anxious to get out to start planting on the nice, warm, sunny days that we will begin to experience, bear in mind that the last frost date in Ocean County varies from May 15-30th depending on your location. The general rule of thumb is to wait until after Mother's Day which is when you will see our club "spring" into action! You may also want to attack any weeds in your garden now so that they won't haunt you all summer. In addition, be reminded that in May and June deer ticks are in the nymph stage and your risk of being bitten is real since our homes are surrounded by many deer families.

Speaking of deer, when we refurbished the RV Garden at the corner of Yorkwood and Lions Head South, we planted a weeping cherry, a hydrangea and burning bush which did not stand up well to the hungry deer. To hopefully prevent these tender new shoots on these plantings from being eaten once again, our members wrapped them in wire fencing and are hoping this will deter any further attacks so that these beautiful trees can establish themselves.

If you are looking for a nice day trip this spring, you may want to visit Deep Cut Gardens at 152 Red Hill Road in Middletown. This county-run park is dedicated to the home gardener. It is a beautiful place to explore and learn, complete with greenhouses, a koi pond, rose garden featuring 52 varieties of roses, and staff who are on hand to answer your gardening questions. Judy has provided the Security Team with a list of contacts and numbers in the event of an emergency or natural disaster. In addition, a Commander from CERT will attend a future residents meeting to discuss how CERT aids and assists residents during an emergency situation.

As the weather warms and residents are out and about, please be reminded to keep our community safe and adhere to the following ordinances:

*Cigarette butts are considered litter and need to be disposed of properly (Town ordinance). **PLEASE NOTE:** This has become an increasing issue and the Security Committee has received NUMEROUS reports from many residents of discarded cigarette butts in designated areas of (beginning of) Meadowbrook Road, Floral Drive and both corners of Lions Head Boulevard South. In addition, many of these cigarette butts are left to burn, which is a fire hazard due to the dryness of our lawns. Residents are urged to be mindful and keep a watchful eye.

*Dog waste **MUST** be picked up and disposed of properly (Town ordinance)

*Vehicles **CANNOT** block sidewalks (Town ordinance)

*Vehicles need to be parked faced in the direction of traffic (Town ordinance)

*No parking of vehicles on lawns (Community Rules/Regulations)

*Visitors/guests are **NOT** allowed to use Fitness Room - it is for RESIDENTS ONLY (Community Rules/Regulations)

After the events, residents would stay behind to enjoy the music and dance Joan even instructed neighbors how to perform. The community was very close knit and enjoyed many fun times around the pool planning their activities.

"Everyone wanted to be together and always made plans to vacation together," Joan added. "These have been the best years of our lives, we've had a good life here, it couldn't be any better!"

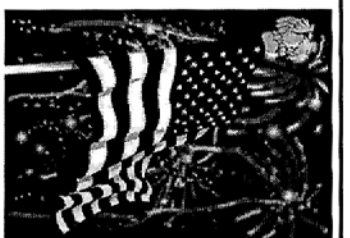

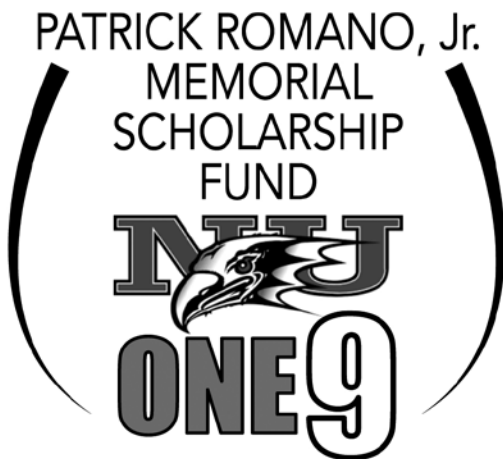

1. **NO LIFEGUARD ON DUTY** Swim at your own risk.
 2. All members/residents and guests must sign-in upon entrance to the pool area.
 3. **THUNDER AND LIGHTNING:** When thunder occurs, all individuals must leave the pool area. The pool area will be reopened when conditions permit.
 4. **FOR SAFETY REASONS** – Pool furniture must be kept at least six (6) feet from the edge of the pool.
 5. Restrooms shall not be used as changing rooms. Dripping bathing suits and bare feet are not allowed in the clubhouse and restroom.
 6. At all times members/residents and/or guests 16 or over must display numbered plastic badges for admission to the pool area.
 7. Children 15 or under must be accompanied and supervised by a responsible adult and must be signed in. No child aged 2-15 will be allowed in the pool between 1pm and 5pm except on Saturdays, when they are allowed in the pool from 12pm – 5pm. Children under the age of 2 are not allowed in the pool at any time. Diapers are not permitted at any age.
 8. Bathers must wear suitable bathing suits or swim wear. Cut-off pants or jeans are not permitted in the pool.
 9. Flotation objects, such as inflatable tubes, kickboards, and flippers, are not permitted in the pool. Styrofoam belts and arm “swimmies” will be permitted in the pool when an adult is in the pool with the child.
 10. Diving is not permitted at any time. Jumping into the pool is permitted when standing on the edge. Lap lanes must be kept open for lap swimmers.
 11. Bathers shall not sit on the stairs or ladders of the pool, **FOR SAFETY REASONS.**
 12. Snacks, plastic bottles and cans are permitted inside the pool area and must be consumed at a table. **NO GLASS OR ALCOHOL IS ALLOWED.** Picnic tables are available outside the pool area for those having sandwiches, subs, pizza, etc.

A charcoal grill is available for your use outside the pool area. A fire shovel and ash can are also provided. Please clean up after use.

Garbage and recyclables must be disposed of in the receptacles that are provided outside of the pool entrance.
 13. No sports, including ball playing or horseplay, will be permitted in the pool area. Children may have dive toys in the shallow end of the pool. Running is not permitted in the pool area. Loud music is not permitted.
 14. Pets are not permitted in the pool area.
 15. Smoking and vaping is permitted only at the end of the sidewalk in the parking area. Smoking and vaping is not permitted near the pool area or in any other sports area.
 16. Chairs, tables and lounges are available to residents on first come basis. **THEY MAY NOT BE RESERVED.** Please bring chairs for your guests.
 17. Upon exiting the pool area, please return chairs and lounges to their regular locations. Umbrellas are to be rolled down and tied.
 18. Our pool maintenance company is Pool Operation Management.

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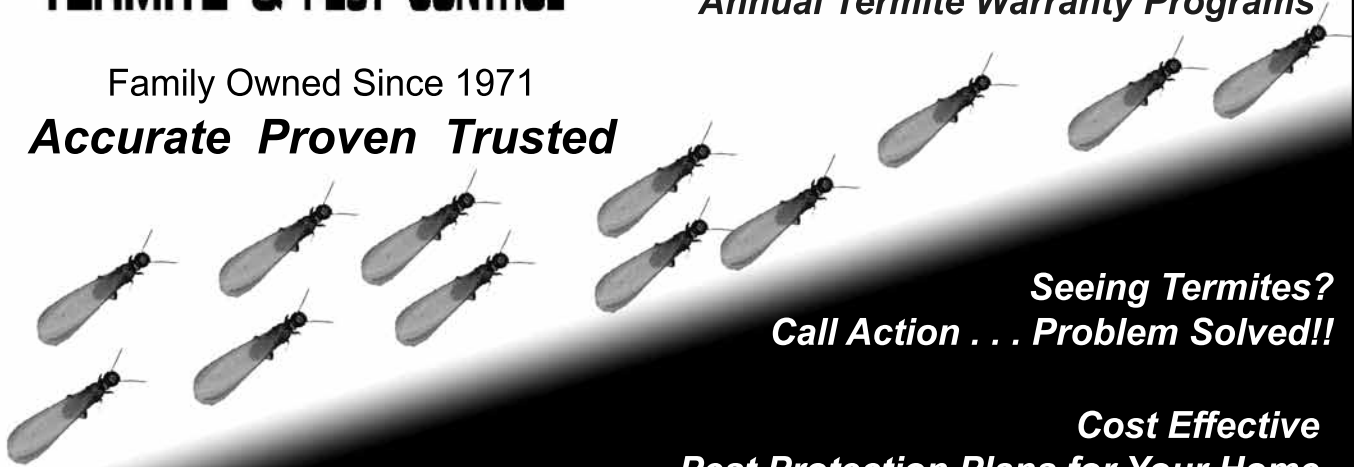
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BUILDING AND GROUNDS

The Buildings and Grounds Committee welcomes the warmer weather and sunshine that abounds.

Turf Masters has resumed its regularly scheduled services with lawn cutting, edging, fertilizing and spring clean-up! The Lawn Maintenance schedule for the year was in the April edition of the Lions Pride. As a reminder, if you have any concerns or issues, please call Turf Masters directly at: 732-349-0444.

Federal Irrigation returned in April and has turned on our sprinkler systems. If you have any complaints or issues, retrieve a Federal Irrigation form outside the Clubhouse and place in the Complaint Box. All problems will be investigated within 24-48 hours. Federal Irrigation: 732-349-9905.

Buildings & Grounds submitted a proposal from Turf Masters for a pond re-design at the entrance of LHS. The quote was approved by the Board of Trustees to remove the mulch, grade around the pond and add stone. In addition, B & G is working with the Garden Club to plant selected shrubbery, plants, and flowers to beautify our front entrance/exit.

Buildings & Grounds would like to remind residents to utilize sidewalks to keep our community members safe. Walking in the roadway is prohibited and potentially dangerous.
