



#### **GARDEN CLUB**

Well, it is hard to believe that soon the holidays will be upon us. The Garden Club has been busy as one can witness with their fall decorating duties completed, and now it is nearly time to begin our winter work!

At our September meeting, it was reported that we shared with Turfmaster our recommendations for plantings at the front entrance. We hope you'll enjoy what we have chosen. I would like to also invite you to view the bulletin board the Garden Club maintains just outside the entrance to the main room at the clubhouse.

As you all probably have removed your annuals by now and your ornamental cabbage, mums, and pansies have taken their place, they too may be subject to a very cold night. So, enjoy them while you can. Mums can be cut back once spent and planted in the ground and covered with mulch to once again be enjoyed in the spring. Tulips and daffodils may still be planted for spring bloom even after a first frost. All beds would enjoy a 2-4 inch covering of mulch during this season. Drain your garden hoses and clean and oil your garden tools before storing them until spring.

Bushes and hedges may be trimmed before the cold weather comes. Pruning should be done once weather is cool and dry. Dead branches should be pruned to encourage growth. Perennial beds should be well watered before the ground freezes.

Indoor plants should be checked to ensure they are receiving enough water, humidity and air circulation. Check for spider mites and scale and treat as needed. Cut back on feeding of houseplants at this time.

#### Some fun garden facts:

- A sunflower is not just one flower but 1000-2000 individual flowers held together on a single stalk as found in the fuzzy brown center and the classic yellow petals.
- Plants really do respond to sound! A silent greenhouse compared to one with a voice soundtrack piped in found that plants in the latter grew more!
- You can change the color of your hydrangeas by altering the ph level of the soil. A more alkaline soil will result in pinker blooms while acidic soil will result in blue blooms. To coax your plant to the blue side, add organic matter to your soil like egg shells and coffee grounds. The change won't happen overnight but eventually you should succeed.
- Deer with a running start can jump eight feet! Tiny fences won't keep them out. Try planting thorny or


pungent plants or try scaring them off with lights or wind chimes.

Just as an FYI, the Garden Club volunteers don't just play in the dirt. but we also have some fun without getting dirty. We will be enjoying a November potluck luncheon at the clubhouse for our members. That will be a first for this group as we usually visit a local restaurant, so we will be enjoying everyone's favorite dish! Looking forward to it. YUM!

On this note, I would like to invite other interested community members to come join us. The signup sheet is posted in the clubhouse hallway during the month of November. We do not meet in December, January and February so we will not meet again until March, 2022 on the second Wednesday of the month at 10:30 a.m. We are an active, fun group and you will learn as you go, always working with a veteran member if you have no previous gardening experience.



House Painting:

The Architecture Committee would like to remind homeowners of the process involved with painting your house.

As with any work to be performed, approval from the Committee is required before work starts which begins with an application submitted to the LHS Office along with a color sample of the paint. The steps involved in painting are as follows:

1. Power wash the house.

2. Paint the house with primer to ensure the surface is ready to accept paint.

3. Paint the house with the color approved by the Committee.

It is also acceptable to paint the brick on the front of the home. The color must be the same as the siding currently on the home.

This process can be started with an application submitted to the LHS Office.

Adding creativity to the 2021 menu, several of our community friends and family have offered & inspired some NEWNESS to the menu. I look forward to the results.

#### Creamy Cheesy Cauliflower Soup

#### Ingredients:

1 cup chopped onion

2 1/2 cups low sodium chicken broth

1/2 cup fat free milk

2 oz. Cabot 50% reduced fat cheddar, grated (about 1/2 cup) 2 tbsp. chopped fresh dill.

#### **Directions:**

1. Coat a large saucepan with cooking spray, sauté onion over med. heat until tender. Add cauliflower & cook for 2 mins.

2. Add broth and milk and bring to a boil. Reduce heat and simmer with cover for 30 mins.

3. Remove from heat: puree soup with a hand blender. Whisk in cheese and continue stirring until cheese is melted. Sprinkle with dill.

Serve with French baguette slices or cubes. Makes 4 servings.

#### <u>Slow cooker French Pork</u>

#### **Ingredients:**

1 boneless Roast Pork
2 tbsp olive oil
2 tbsp. flour
1 tbsp. herbs de Provence
1 1/2 tsp salt
3/4 tsp pepper
2 med onions
1 cup apple cider
1 cup beef stock
2 bay leaves
2 large tart apples > peel, core & chop
1 cup pitted dried plums

#### **Directions:**

1. Mix flour, herbs de Provence, salt & pepper. Heat oil in skillet, coat pork with flour mixture & brown in skillet. Place in slow cooker.

2. Add onions, apple cider, beef stock & bay leaf in slow cooker, cover & cook low for 3 hrs.

3. Add apples & plums, cook for 1 1/2 hrs.

4. Remove roast, onions, apples & plums to serving platter. Tent & slice after 15 mins. Discard the bay leaf. \*\*\*\* Recipe sent by Michael Brunas

#### Fresh Fig Cookies Ingredients

- 1 cup sugar
- 1/2 cup shortening
- 1 egg
- 2 cups all-purpose flour
- 1/2 tsp salt
- 1 tsp baking soda
- 1 tsp baking powder
- 1/2 tsp ground cloves
- 1 cup chopped fresh figs
- 1/2 cup walnuts

#### Directions:

- 1. Preheat oven to  $350^{\circ}$
- 2. Cream sugar, shortening & egg
- 3. Sift dry ingredients & blend with creamed mixture.
- 4. Fold in walnuts & figs

5. Drop spoonfuls on greased cookie sheet. Bake for 15 - 20 mins.
